**TB incidence decreased by over 50% in 2018 [THE KASHMIR MONITOR]** January 10<sup>th</sup>, 2019

Directorate of Health Services Kashmir Wednesday claimed that valley witnessed a drastic decrease in incidence of Tuberculosis in 2018. As per the official figures, 10,322 Tuberculosis cases were reported in Kashmir in 2017. The patients were detected, notified, and accordingly treatment. <u>Read more</u>

**Private doctors to face action for not notifying TB patients to health department [PUNE MIRROR]** January 9<sup>th</sup>, 2019

As per the national strategic plan, the government aims to eradicate tuberculosis (TB) by 2025, but still, noncooperation by private doctors to notify TB patients by them is a major challenge. The Maharashtra state Public Health department has decided to start taking action against such private doctors who have failed to notify about tuberculosis patients treated by them. According to officials, over half of all TB patients treated in India seek care in the private sector, but case notifications from these private sectors are still way behind those in government hospitals. <u>Read more</u>
